Seasons

heavy snows lead to a verdant spring

A snowstorm and widespread power failure ushered in 2019 in Klagetoh. Following several years of below average snowfall, the Klagetoh area received approximately two feet in the first two months of the year.

The Navajo Nation declared a snow emergency in February. Under the declaration the tribe was able to spend reserve funds and dispatch additional tractors and road-clearing equipment to clear snow from remote dirt roads where people were trapped. The tribe also delivered emergency food and water to people who were “snowed in”.

Mission vehicles were involved in a couple of “slide offs” on slick and snow-covered roads. Fortunately none of the incidents resulted in injuries or significant damage to the vehicles.



As the storms passed, the melting snow transformed Reservation dirt roads into impassable avenues of mud.

Early January also saw nighttime lows below zero. Several residents turned to the Mission for emergency supplies of firewood. With difficult travel conditions, the Mission’s emergency food pantry was also relied on by people in need.


Locals told me that they had not seen that much snow since 2001. The Flagstaff airport recorded nearly 4 feet in 24 hours, setting a new record.

The first of the Missions 2019 volunteers arrived on the heels on the big February storm. Fortunately, the teens from Bishop Guertin High School in New Hampshire were experienced in the art of snow removal. Their efforts mitigated the conditions at the Mission.

The result of all that precipitation has been a greener than usual Springtime. Wildflowers are abundant and the whole area around Klagetoh is as verdant as we’ve ever seen.

Church Update

This Spring the Mission undertook a project to update the area behind the altar in the Mission Church. The reddish brick wall fascia to which the church crucifix was attached was covered with drywall and painted a light blue. The crucifix itself was suspended from the ceiling several inches in front of the new surface. This project was undertaken to make the crucifix and tabernacle more visible as liturgical focal points in the church.



As a finishing touch, Brother Robert installed hardwood planking over the old painted plywood surface to which the tabernacle was attached.

Still to come is the installation of improved spotlights for the crucifix and the statues of the Sacred Heart and St. Anne that flank the altar.

Community Projects

A main goal of our volunteer program is to put visitors in contact with members of the local community with an aim to experiencing some of the realities of their day-to-day life while providing some material support to those in special needs.

Occasionally that means building, and delivering, a new outhouse.
